Powerful teaching and learning tools for both students and teachers, blogs can be used for reflection and learning logs, student journals, team blogs for group work, communication between home and community, collaborative learning communities, teacher and class webpages, a class portal, and more.

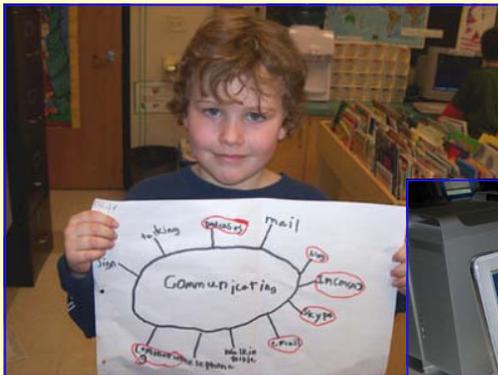

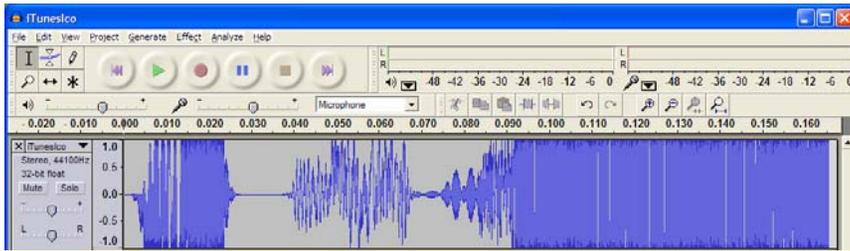

The Potential of Podcasting



Podcasting is the creation and distribution of digital recording. Podcasts can have incredible instructional benefits for reading, writing, speaking, and research skills. Podcasting can be used to record and share classroom news, radio shows, stories, interviews, reenactments of historical events, lesson reviews, special events, guided tours, and more.

At this session, you will:

- ◆ Learn all about Podcasting, how they are being used in classrooms, how to create and publish, how to publish them, and the simple tools you'll need
- ◆ Explore ideas and strategies for using Podcasts with your students
- ◆ Create a Podcast and a plan for trying out Podcasting in your classroom.

Educators are starting to see how podcasting can help hone students' vocabulary, writing, editing, public speaking, and presentation skills, said Dan J. Schmit, an instructional-technology specialist at the University of Nebraska's college of education. Students can also learn skills that will be valuable in the working world, such as communication, time management, and problem-solving, he said."



7th grader Alyssa M. Gilbertson described the appeal of creating a podcast. "When you're writing an essay," she said, "you don't try your hardest because after you're done, you throw it away or put it in a box." But with podcasts, she said, "now we try a lot harder because we want other people to know that we [can] do more. We want people to hear us."

Digital Storytelling

There are many different definitions of "digital storytelling", but in general, all of them revolve around the idea of combining the art of telling stories with any of the variety of available multimedia tools, including graphics, audio, video animation, and Web publishing.

The process of digital storytelling respects the writing process first. The inclusion of the technology into the process represents a "value-added" approach by extending the learning experience beyond what could be accomplished without technology.

At this session you will:

- ◆ Learn about Digital Storytelling, how it is being used in classrooms, how to create digital stories, how to publish them, and the simple tools that you'll need.
- ◆ Explore ideas and strategies for using Digital Storytelling with your students.
